Reminder: What is a CEDS?

- A locally-based, regionally-driven economic development roadmap that guides government and community action.
- Brings the **private and public sector** together to develop a **regional strategy and action plan**.
- Identifies projects and makes recommendations to:

Numbers that tell the FNSB story – people, economy





PURPOSE & OUTCOMES

- The 2022 Interior Alaska Economic Summit will inform development of the updated 5-Year Fairbanks North Star Borough Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS).
- Participants will review and confirm CEDS components, including a shared economic development vision, goals, and 5-year priorities.
- The updated CEDS will better position the community for funding & investment opportunities.

Your Thoughts on the Proposed Economic Vision

The Land of the Midnight Sun & Golden Heart of Alaska is a global economic hub, where families, businesses, adventurers, and opportunities thrive.

- Feels generic → Remove "global" → Add "Arctic"
- Remove "Land of the Midnight Sun" → Keep "Golden Heart"
- Everyone should see themselves in the vision are we being equitable?

Land Use, Housing, and Environment

Project idea:


Conduct housing needs assessment and plans for annual updates.

Project idea:

Conduct outreach to increase community knowledge of existing land use policies that impact business development, housing, recreation, etc.

Project idea:

Continue to take steps to improve air quality with a focus on reducing PM2.5.



Recreation & Entertainment

Project idea:

Secure funding for and implement phases 2 of the Pioneer Park Master Plan, including opening the park to the riverfront, adding a multi-purpose center.

Indicator idea:

Miles of trail in FNSB.




Transportation

Within the work you/your department does, including related plans and policies:

- What factors contribute to economic development/economic success in the FNSB?
- What factors are a barrier to economic development/economic success in the FNSB?

Discussion Notes: Contributing Factors, Strengths

- Local builders, developers, surveyors are gaining experience, increasing collaboration, and strategically building in phases to meet new construction demand and housing need; Brookside Park is one successful case study
- Potential for future rail expansions: to Delta Junction, to Canada (G2G)
- Quality summer outdoor recreation opportunities such as Tanana Lakes and Chena Lakes
- The new, self-reporting web tool for road problems has been successful

Discussion Notes: Barriers, Part 1

- •Limited zoning compliance, especially regarding flood plain regulations; risk of losing participation in the National Flood Insurance Program
- Limited indoor and outdoor winter recreation opportunities
- Competing interests: one of the greatest challenges with land use planning is creating policies that balance competing interests (profits, access, safety, character, etc.)
- Past subdivisions (especially in the 1980s, 1990s) created lots without appropriate road access, including some borough-initiated subdivisions
- Lack of borough authority in key areas like health, housing, zoning/flood plain compliance limits the tools available for the borough to respond to community needs

Discussion Notes: Barriers, Part 2

- •Lack of beautification along roadways; in 2005 FNSB Comprehensive Plan phone survey, this was identified as the #1 community priority
- Potential redistribution of transportation funding with the upcoming Mat-Su
 Metropolitan Planning Organization designation
- •Roads that are not maintained/orphan roads; this presents a challenge for developers and businesses; "they look at it and say, 'I have to maintain my own road? That's not a cost I was planning on'"
- High cost of utilities and lack of coordination between developers and utility companies; "sometimes it's easier to just put in a four-plex on well and septic"
- Lack of affordable options and coverage for phone and internet
- High cost of electricity and no competition
- Need more areas for snow dumps

Discussion Notes: Ideas & Opportunities

- Explore creative ways of incentivizing cleanups instead of just through penalties. For example, offering cleanup resources such as a loader; waiving taxes for dilapidated properties that are actively being improved
- Expand partnerships with Native Corporations to address community needs around housing, utilities; lots of success in Anchorage
- Build the Alaska Long Trail
- Possibility of redevelopment incentives downtown
- Increase the length of time visitors stay in Fairbanks (including Alaskans); Whitefish, Montana as a success story to emulate
- Advocate to conduct the Alaska Visitor Statistics Program surveys more frequently (e.g., at least once every 2 years)
- Small government doesn't need to be inflexible; the FNSB should continue to strive to adapt to community needs without getting caught in bureaucracy and minutiae
- FNSB planning efforts are not just for the borough, even if they are facilitated by the borough; they are for the betterment of the entire community
- Expanding stewardship and recreation on FNSB-owned lands, such as protecting trails, creating public use cabins; some of this would require code revisions to increase flexibility
- Increasing collaboration between the borough and the two cities (Fairbanks and North Pole) instead of, "that's not our role"
