## Strengths *Internal attributes that contribute to success*

### Natural Resources & Environment

- Proximity to Arctic and extensive open space
- Arctic environment and optimal conditions for testing cold weather readiness and equipment; Arctic Survival Schools

### Businesses, Organizations, & Government

- Alaska National Guard and the 168<sup>th</sup> Wing
- Joint Pacific Alaska Range Complex creates training opportunities and supports integration of all Department of Defense (DoD) military installations
- Local, regional, state, and federal partnerships to support local military missions, installations, and service members and their families
- Proximity to rising powers and potential military threats in the Indo-Pacific region
- Growing aerospace capabilities and research (e.g., Poker Flat Research Range)

### Education & Workforce

- The military is a leading employer and economic driver
- Incoming military personnel offset outmigration losses
- Military spouses as a workforce
- Veteran-friendly community, with many military households choosing to stay after active-duty service
- Close partnerships with University of Alaska Fairbanks (UAF)
- Purple Heart schools

## Weaknesses *Internal barriers to success*

### Natural Resources & Environment

- Air quality nonattainment
- Groundwater and soil contamination; Eielson Air Force Base (EAFB) designation as Superfund site
- Extreme weather and challenges for military households unfamiliar with extreme winter conditions

### Businesses, Organizations, & Government

- Behavioral health and wellness capacity to meet unique needs of military families

### Education & Workforce

- Military spouse licensing transferability

### Infrastructure

- High costs and complex logistics for moving materials and personnel to/from the region
- Potential shortage of affordable and quality housing
- Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) is unequipped to manage increase in flight volume at airport control towers as military base activity increases
- High costs of construction materials
- Lack of sufficient infrastructure (reliable and redundant power, broadband, etc.)
- Lack of a Class A landfill for disposing of hazardous materials

- Increasing international interest in and use of the Arctic

### Businesses, Organizations, & Government

- Military Facility Zone designation by the Alaska Department of Military and Veterans Affairs
- Fort Wainwright (FTW)'s Behavioral Health Epidemiological Consultation (BH EPICON) prepared in response to a series of suicides in the FTW community; the EPICON identified recommendations to improve quality of life for troops
- Incoming KC-135s
- Potential for KC-46 basing
- Reinstating the Army 11<sup>th</sup> Airborne Division as the "Arctic Angels" and establishing Alaska as its operational headquarters
- Ted Stevens Center for Arctic Security Studies (Anchorage)
- DoD's Arctic Strategies (see linked resources)
- Clear Air Force Station change to Clear Space Force Station

### Infrastructure

- Anticipated expansion of ground-based missile defense system missile field at Fort Greely
- FTW Combined Heat and Power Plant

- Ongoing supply chain disruptions due to the pandemic and workforce shortages impacting new construction
- Cybersecurity threats

**1. Strengthen Arctic Defense and Training** – Invest in and strengthen Interior Alaska’s training and Arctic defense capabilities. (Objectives 1, 2)

- a. Construct hangar for KC-135s, considering the potential future need to accommodate KC-46s in the hangar design.
- b. Support basing of KC-46s.
- c. Reinstate the Army 11<sup>th</sup> Airborne Division as the “Arctic Angels” and establish Alaska as its operational headquarters.
- d. Finance and implement needed upgrades to the Joint Pacific Alaska Range Complex (JPARC).

- a. Redevelop Birchwood homesite to regain land for FTW use.
- b. Construct a new FTW physical fitness facility.
- c. Demolish aged housing units.

- d. Continue military and community collaboration through efforts such as the FNSB CivMil and Tiger Team, and the Greater Fairbanks Chamber of Commerce (GFCC) Military Affairs Committee (MAC).
